Our third auction went very well during the March meeting. I would like to thank Mike Paul for running another successful auction. Also thanks to Amelia Osterud and Sue White for moving us into the computer age with the data all being collected and printed out via an Access database. This made the transactions much cleaner








Chapter 47 March Newsletter "Spot a Clock"

This month's 'Spot a Clock' is St. Hyacinth Church, located at 1414 West Becher Street in Milwaukee.



St. Hyacinth is one of several Catholic churches founded on Milwaukee's south side in the late 1800s to early 1900s.These churches were founded to serve the largely Polish population of the area.



St. Hyacinth was founded by Father Jacek Gulski. Father Gulski was born in West Prussia in 1847, and joined the Order of the Franciscan Father s in 1866. He emigrated to the United States in 1875 and initially settled in Berlin, Wisconsin. He transferred to St. Stanislaus parish in Milwaukee in 1876.

The St. Stanislaus parish grew rapidly under his leadership, with the local population of parishioners exceeding the capacity of the church. Father Gulski left the parish to organize a new parish, St. Hyacinth, to the west. Construction started in 1882, and the St. Hyacinth Church was blessed on April 1, 1883.



Based on research conducted by Dr. Joseph Baier and published in the NAWCC <u>Bulletin</u>, The clock movement for the church was purchased from Mathias Schwalbach, a Milwaukee clockmaker. Mr. Schwalbach specialized in church clocks, building movements for over 70 buildings. Most were located in the Milwaukee area, but clocks were sold to churches as far east as New York and as far west as Oregon.



According to Dr. Baier's <u>Bulletin</u> article, the Schwalbach movement was replaced with an electric movement. The church was contacted for additional information, but has not yet returned calls.
