Horological Trivia and Tidbits

One of the most inexpensive mass produced watch has been introduced by Swiss watchmakers, who are known for their precision and expensive watches-this was the Swatch, released for the first time in 1983.

American film director Stanley Kubrick approached the American brand Hamilton in 1966 to ask them to make unique timepieces for his new, futuristic film "2001: A Space Odyssey".

The Hamilton design team provided him with a wristwatch and a desk clock. Hamilton at that time had already introduced the first electric watch (1957, VENTURA) and in 1970 it leveraged the association with the movie by producing a functional wristwatch, the Odyssey 2001 and then the Pulsar with an LED display.

The Patek Philippe Caliber 89 was the world's most complicated mechanical pocket watch (until 2015). Crafted in 1989 it's made of 18K gold, has 24 hands, 1,728 components in total and 33 special features, including a Thermometer and a star chart.

However, the most complicated mechanical watch was made by Vacheron Constantin (model 57260). Boasting 57 complications and a wide array of functions, it contains over 2,800 components, each one hand-decorated by one Master Watchmaker using
